# The Deacon's Corner

Something's different around here. What is it?

We aren't waiting in deep meditation and self-reflection for the powerful and painful re-enactment of Christ's crucifixion. We aren't waiting in

silence wondering if a certain promise is going to be fulfilled. We aren't

dancing in jubilation because of the Resurrection. We aren't waiting yet

again for the outpouring of grace in the arrival of the Holy Spirit, or

rushing out into the world being newly endowed with that Spirit's

power. Those transformative events have happened; we have lived

them, we have breathed them, we have fully experienced them.

That's what's different! Everything is ORDINARY now.

It's the season after Pentecost, known in some places as an ORDINARY time.

Now the focus is on the life of the Church, on our lives now that we have been given the gift of these experiences and all that they imply, all that they teach, all that they mean. What are we going to do with all this, that's the question that's being answered in the ordinary days. Where do we go from here?

We're finding out together.

Now, in the life of the Diocese of New Jersey, the times are not so ordinary. There's the end of one era and the beginning of another taking place. As I write this, we are preparing for the installation of Bishop-elect Sally Johnson French. By the time most of you read this, she will be Bishop. We walked through a great deal of change and new beginnings under Bishop William ("Chip") Stokes, and we will most likely do so with our new Bishop as well. It's always a time of change somewhere in the world.

So in the times when there is no earth shattering Biblical event that we are getting ready to re experience or for which to prepare, we look into the ordinary world. We look for God's signals everywhere to give us some ideas about the ways that we will live out the Gospel. After all, this is the season AFTER Pentecost...the Spirit is here, and we have been given the Great Commission. So it's important, I think, for us to be on the lookout all the time for places and ways that we can live into that.

Where do you see God giving you ideas? I see it in the wild animals and birds finding food in the grass and the greenery. I see it in the trees that didn't survive the drought but are serving as support frames for flowering vines, wildflowers, holly, Rose of Sharon, and the like. I see it in peacemaking between people who have had adversarial relationships in the past but decide to focus on what they have in common rather than where they oppose one another. I hear it in the music in the church, the laughter over coffee cups, the expressions of joy at the accomplishments of a young person. The ideas are strewn everywhere. My job, your job, our job is to look for them and use them.

May this time give you the peace of mind of the everyday ordinary and the power of the extraordinary as well!

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
At Christ Church we are committed to making a difference . The items collected during our school supplies drive were delivered to South Amboy school yesterday by Inell and Terry.

Two new volunteers at our Thrift Store. We are lucky to have them!







Come see us at the Thrift Store every Saturday morning from 9 to 12. We are always looking for volunteers!


**The Stained Glass Windows of Christ Church By Steve Osterberg** 

The beautiful stained-glass windows in Christ Church are primarily a ministry of color which helps to transform our Church building into a house of worship. But they are more than just mere decorations. In keeping with the name of the parish, they portray the highlights of Christ's earthly life. A number of the windows are new since the explosion of 1950 that destroyed several of our original windows. Stained glass is a hand craft practiced in America today in virtually the same manner as it was in Europe in the Middle Ages. Each window has an associated Bible text that can be used for meditation and reflection.
